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# Transition to Modern Economic Growth

- Recent historical accounting studies shed a new light on the economic growth before the Industrial Revolution.
- Most countries experienced a recurrent pattern of positive growth episodes, followed by growth reversals.
- The transition to modern economic growth occurred gradually as growth reversals were dampened and eventually eliminated.
- This transition occurred first in Britain.

### Japan in the pre-modern time

- Agricultural output is estimated from information in temple and government records and old encyclopedias.
- After 1600, data on crops harvested was made available by Hideyoshi's nationwide land survey (1590).

- Between 725 and 1730, there were recurrent cycles of acceleration and slowdown of GDP per capita.
- However, acceleration continued after 1730, which prepared for the take-off for the modern economic growth.
- Dampened growth reversals is essential for the modern economic growth to start.

## Escaping away from subsistence

- According to the World Bank, the subsistence level of annual income per capita is \$400.
- Japan's GDP per capita stagnated at the subsistence level for 725-1600.
- However, GDP per capita continued to rise from \$600 in 1600 to \$800 in 1850.

#### Little and Great Divergence

- Little Divergence
  - Between Britain and Holland in the North Sea area.
  - Between Italy and Spain in the Mediterranean economies.
  - Between Japan, China, and India in Asia.
- The whole story is not so simple as the Great Divergence between Europe and Asia.
- Rather both continents contained dynamic and stagnant parts.

### Japan and China


- China was the richest country in the world in the 11<sup>th</sup> century, when it was ruled by the Northern Song dynasty.
- However, China continued to stagnate long after Japan became the growth leader in Asia in the 18<sup>th</sup> century.
- Japan's rapid development in the 19<sup>th</sup> century depends not only on the technology and ideas imported from Europe, but also on the dynamic internal forces that raised GDP per capita in the early modern time.






#### Mediaeval Time




- China was the richest economy around 1000, then declined.
- In mediaeval time, both northern and southern Europe was richer than China.
- Japan's GDP per capita was as half as that of England in the 16<sup>th</sup> century.

#### Mediaeval – Pre-Modern




- Southern Europe was richer than north-western Europe before 1550
- Since 1550, north-western Europe overwhelmed southern Europe.
- China was richer than Japan until 1750, while Japan overcame China since 1750.
- Japan was highly decentralized. Each domain had a strong incentive to develop economy.
- China was slow in innovation due to the high cost of concentration of power to the emperor.

### Meiji Era




- USA and UK led had driven the global economy until the WW1.
   Their GDP per capita was \$2000 in 1850 and \$4500 in 1910.
- France and Germany followed USA and UK. Their GDP per capita was \$1500 in 1850 to &3500 in 1910.
- Japan's GDP per capita was over \$1000 In 1870 and still around &1500 in 1910.
- China's GDP per capita was less than half of Japan's GDP per capita.

## The Inter-War period



- Both UK and US started as rich as 5000 in 1910, and achieved GDP per capita 7000 in 1940.
- France and Germany started at the comparable GDP level in 1910, but Germany overwhelmed France in 1940. (GDP per capita = 3000 to 5000).
- Japan's GDP per capita was 1500 in 1914, while it reached to 3000.
- American and European economies was seriously damaged by the Great Depression, which did not hurt Japan so much.
- China continued to stagnated around 500 of GDP per capita.

## The Post-War period



- The economic growth of the leading economies was amazing.
- Among them Japan seemed to catch up USA until 1990.
- Since 1990, Japan's GDP per capita growth slowed down, partly because of population aging.

## Overview (1600-1874)

- Population became twice (17mil->34mil).
- Urban concentration of population (6%->10%)
- Aggregate GDP measured in rice became triple (41->129).
- Share of primary sector (73%->59%)
- Share of secondary sector (8%->12%)
- Share of tertiary sector (17%->28%)
- GDP per capita in 1990 dollars (667->1013)

- Population grew rapidly in the 17<sup>th</sup> century.
- Population growth rate declined in the middle of the Edo era.
- There is no stagnation.
- Growth in GDP per capita seems to be accelerating.

#### International Comparison (1300-1850)

- Great Divergence is observed between the west and the east: The western economy overwhelmed the eastern one.
- Regional divergence in the west: The northwestern Europe (UK and Netherland) caught up the southern Europe (Italy and Spain) in 16<sup>th</sup> century, and pulled far ahead of the latter since then.
- Regional divergence in the east: Japan caught up and ran ahead of China, which shrank since the medieval to pre-modern periods.
