Corona

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- Blue line shows the original model without capacity constraint.
- Red line illustrates the case that medical treatment is bounded by the medical capacity.

The Repeated Lockdowns

Medical Capacity

- Without lockdown, the first peak is the highest, while it is followed by no second attack.
- Medical capacity is maintained under a stricter contact control, while the economy is attacked by the second infection.



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Immunity

- With no contact control, the economy reaches herd immunity after the first attack.
- With contact control, the economy acquires herd immunity with lower levels of the virus infection.

Labor Force and Output

A stricter control is associated with a smaller loss in labor force and a higher long-run output.

Two Lockdowns followed by two recovery

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Medical Capacity

- Without mobility control, 2% of people need to be cared at the hospital, which violates the medical capacity that is .3% of the population, while the pandemic is completed at the first attack.
- If mobility control is enforced, people stay home under the mobility control, and the initial attack is followed by the 2nd and the 3rd attacks.

Herd Immunity

- Without Mobility control, herd immunity is achieved at the first attack.
- With mobility control, herd immunity is achieved at a lower level of antibody possession.
- The "hammer-and-dance" strategy makes sense.

Labor force and output

- Labor force loss is the highest for the case with no mobility control.
- There are large output losses for the cases with mobility control.

Ratio of infectious agents all to recognized

- Na denotes people infected, not diagnosed, and remains in the labor force.
- Nt denotes patients hospitalized, while Ns stay at home
- The ratio of all the infected people to the people infected and diagnosed is as large as 10, while it immediately falls down to around two.

Ratio of Growth Rate of Diagnosed to all Infected

- The growth rate of the diagnosed infected people is 5 times as high as the growth rate of all the infected people.
- But it soon falls below one.
- In other words, the diagnosed infected people grow more slowly than all the infected people.

Initial Immunity

- NG(0) denotes the initial (natural) immunity.
- A higher initial immunity lowers the peak created by the initial attack.

Herd Immunity and Initial Immunity

- Higher Initial (natural) Immunity leads to herd immunity with a lower level of antibody possession.
- The BCG or the past experiences of people to be exposed to any other virus make them more resilient.

- s denotes the probability that an infected person is diagnosed positive.
- A higher testing (finding) rate reduces the peak caused by the first virus attack, not followed by the second attack.
- A strict testing policy needs to be arranged with a similarly strict policy to contain people diagnosed positive in containment facilities, like South Korea.

Immunity remains low under strict testing

- A stricter testing policy achieves herd immunity at a lower level of infection.
- The society is vulnerable to the second virus attack which is brought by outside.
- South Korea is famous for its strict testing policy, while it is vulnerable to the second attack, since its level of herd immunity is low.

Labor Force and Output

A stricter testing policy brings smaller losses in labor force and output.

The Cosine Curve

- If the meeting rate changes like the cosine curve, the pandemic is completed at the initial attack, and there is no second or third attack.
- Under mobility control, the meeting rate falls at a slower speed at the beginning, then approaches its target at a faster speed.

No need to have a second Lockdown

Medical Capacity

- Consider the situation that hospitals do not accept patients if their capacity is short of the population of patients.
- Those who are not accepted by hospitals take care of themselves at their home.
- The quality of self-care is lower than the quality of staying at hospitals.
- Self-cared patients die at higher rate and recover to be healthy at a lower rate.
- Let c be the medical capacity. I simulate the model for c=.001 and c=.005
- Nt: in hospital, and Nz: out of hospital

No contact control, c=.001 Most people cannot be hospitalized At peak, 2.3% of people need being hospitalized, while capacity is .1%

Looser contact control, c=.001 Most people cannot be hospitalized At peak, 0.6% of people need being hospitalized, while capacity is .1%

Tighter contact control, c=.001 Most people cannot be hospitalized At peak, 0.5% of people need being hospitalized, while capacity is .1%

No contact control, c=.005

Most people cannot be hospitalized At peak, 2.5% of people need being hospitalized, while capacity is .5%

Looser contact control, c=.005At peak, 0.45% of people need being hospitalized, and all of them are hospitalized.

Looser contact control, c=.005At peak, 0.4% of people need being hospitalized, and all of them are hospitalized.

Lower medical capacity is followed by larger loss in labor force and output

Welfare

- People act forward-looking. Then the value functions are solved by backward induction.
- In this model, however, people act mechanically
- At time T, the economy reaches a steady state after the virus pandemic is over.
- Then solving value functions is equivalent to solving a terminal value problem, while the distribution of people is solved as a usual initial-value problem.
- We assume the meeting rate follows a repeated hammer-anddance process as in the right-above.
- The terminal values at time T are given as in the right-below.
- Vz_T denotes the value of being ill without being hospitalized.
- The file: corona047-value-dynamics-correct.

The Aggregate Welfare

 $W_t \coloneqq Nh_t \cdot Vh_t + Na_t \cdot Va_t + Ns_t \cdot Vs_t + Nt_t \cdot Vt_t + Nz_t \cdot Vz_t + Ng_t \cdot Vg_t$

- The aggregate welfare is the population-weighted sum of individual life-time utility of being at each state.
- At time 0, the aggregate welfare drops down from W=156 to W=112 since the life is threatened by the virus pandemic, then it gradually recovers to its original level.

A Spanish Flu pattern

- Na: infectious and not recognized in the labor market.
- Ns: infected and separated from the labor market.
- Nt: infected and hospitalized.
- Nz: infected and not hospitalized because of medical capacity shortage.

The values changes accordingly.

Shallow or Deep?

- The meeting rate starts at a=16.
- The meeting rate is maintained at a=16, or goes down to a1=13 (loose regulation), or a2=10 (tight regulation).
- There is a medical capacity c=.001

The terminal values

- The terminal values are not different so much, mainly reflecting the loss of labor force.
- The files is corona047-LRLR-dynamics-target.

Herd Immunity

- Herd Immunity is achieved at lower level of infection if people are protected by a tighter regulation.
- This is a major benefit of regulation on mobility.

Welfare gain of mobility control

- A tighter contact control is followed by a larger output loss, while the loss is compensated by a larger output after the pandemic is over.
 The welfare gap is not
- The welfare gap is not so large between a1=13 and a2=16, suggesting that a tighter regulation is not rewarded by enough gains.

- Consider a mobility control policy with a1=16 and $a_G=10$.
- Medical capacity constraint c0=.001 or c1=.005.
- Pandemic occurs three times.
- Under c0=.001, some infected people are not hospitalized.

Larger medical capacity reduces labor force loss

Medical capacity makes no big difference in welfare.

Welfare

- After all, causing a medical collapse without mobility control will result in more long-term workforce loss, but in smaller short-term economic loss.
- In order to evaluate economic welfare, the question is how to take the lost utility of dead people into account.
- The total utility goes down as the population declines
- Can we evaluate economic welfare appropriately, by simply adding the lifetime utility of people alive?
