# Friedman rule in the OLG model

- Monetary OLG models (CIA/MIUF/Random relocation)
  - Authors including Abel (1987), Freeman (1987), Yakita (1989), Crettez et al. (2002) study the monetary policy in the OLG models.
  - Bhattacharya et al. (JME 2005): a deviation from the Friedman rule of setting the nominal interest rate (i) to zero can improve welfare because it generates intergenerational wealth transfers.
- Lagos and Wright (JPE 2005, henceforth LW): one of the advantages of the search models over the existing models is that the role of money is explicit in the search models (microfoundation).
- We study the monetary OLG model with search, and focus on the roles of financial intermediation .

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### Money and banking in the search model

- Berentsen, Camera and Waller (JET 2007, henceforth BCW) incorporate financial intermediation into LW.
  - Day sub-period: Decentralized markets (**DM**) open. Before trading, the individual can borrow money or make deposit at the bank.
  - Night sub-period: Centralized market (CM) opens. The buyer pays interest to the seller through the bank.
- Results of BCW
  - The optimal monetary policy follows the Friedman rule. Under the rule, financial intermediation does not affect the allocation/welfare.
  - **2** Quantity in the DM (q) is a decreasing function of *i*.
  - 3 The banking sector raises welfare when i is positive.

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Research	motiva	tion			

- Check whether the results in the BCW hold in the OLG model with search.
  - Is the Friedman rule still optimal?
  - Is the financial intermediation beneficial?
- The main differences between infinite horizons model and the OLG model:
  - Intergenerational transfer.
  - **Quasi-linearity of the utility function in the CM.**

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• Zhu (JET 2008) constructs OLG model with search.

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- The utility function in the CM is strictly concave.
- Find that optimal money growth rate is positive.
- Constraints on money never bind and then the optimal nominal interest rate is zero.
- Jacquet and Tan (JME 2012) study OLG model with idiosyncratic shock and find that assets become heterogeneous in liquidity.
- We consider financial intermediation in the OLG model with search. The set-up is close to Zhu (2008) and Jacquet and Tan (2012).

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Set-up					

- Time is discrete. Each period has two sub-periods (day/night). DMs open in the day sub-period, and CM opens at night.
- In each period, a continuum of individual with measure one is born at night, and lives for three sub-periods.
  - Ist stage (night): receive \(\overline{\overlin}\overlin{\overline{\overline{\overlin{\uverline{\overlin{\uverlin
  - 2nd stage (day): become a buyer with prob 0.5, and a seller with prob 0.5. Use the bank, and trade. Utility function: u(q), -c(q).
  - Signal 3rd stage (night): receive  $\bar{\omega}$  units of general good, pay or receive interest, consume and leave.
- Transactions in the DM need money. Central bank prints money. New money is injected to the young.

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Seller's r	roblem	in the DM			

- A seller with *m* units of money sells *q* units of the DM goods to a buyer. The price is *p*.
- The seller makes a deposit all the money in the bank, and solves

$$V_s(m) = \max[-c(q) + U(C^s)],$$
 (1)

$$C^s = (1+i)\phi m + \phi pq + \bar{\omega}, \qquad (2)$$

where  $\phi$  is the price of money.

• The first order condition (FOC)

$$c'(q) = \phi p U'(C^s). \tag{3}$$

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- $\bullet$  A buyer with m units of money buys q units of the DM goods.
- The buyer borrows pq m units of money from the bank:

$$V_{b}(m) = \max[u(q) + U(C^{b})],$$

$$C^{b} = -(1+i)\phi(pq - m) + \bar{\omega}.$$
(5)

• The FOC

$$u'(q) = (1+i)\phi pU'(C^b).$$
 (6)

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Banking s	ector				

- Accept nominal deposit at rate *i*, and make loan at rate *i*.
- The bank can force repayment at no cost, and is subject to the free entry conditions.
- In equilibrium, pq m = m. Thus

$$pq = 2m. (7)$$

- In models without banking, pq = m.
- We focus on the case with positive *i*.



• The individual solves ( $\delta < 1$  :discount factor)

$$V = \max U(C^{y}) + \frac{\delta}{2} [V_{b}(m_{+1}) + V_{s}(m_{+1})], \qquad (8)$$

s.t. 
$$\bar{\omega}^y = \phi m_{+1} + C^y - \tau \phi M_{+1}.$$
 (9)

- Growth rate of money supply is  $\tau$ :  $M_{+1} = (1 + \tau)M$ .
- The FOCs on money (Euler equation)

$$U'(C^y) = \delta(1+i)\frac{\phi_{+1}}{\phi} \left\{ \frac{U'(C^b_{+1}) + U'(C^s_{+1})}{2} \right\}.$$
 (10)

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#### Competitive equilibrium

Real balances:

$$\rho = \phi m. \tag{11}$$

- $\bullet$  Equilibrium allocation:  $(i,p,\rho,q,C^y,C^b,C^s)$
- The budget constraints:

1st : 
$$\bar{\omega}^y = C^y + \rho,$$
 (12)

3rd (b) : 
$$C^b_{+1} = -(1+i)(\phi_{+1}p_{+1}q_{+1} - \rho_{+1}) + \bar{\omega},$$
 (13)

3rd (s) : 
$$C_{+1}^s = (1+i)\rho_{+1} + \phi_{+1}p_{+1}q_{+1} + \bar{\omega}.$$
 (14)

• The expenditure on the DM good is twice as much as the money balances:

$$\phi pq = 2\rho. \tag{15}$$

• The FOCs in the first stage

$$U'(C^y) = 0.5 \frac{1+i}{1+\tau} \frac{\rho_{+1}}{\rho} \delta\{U'(C^b_{+1}) + U'(C^s_{+1})\}.$$

• The FOCs in the second stage

$$q_{+1}u'(q_{+1}) = 2\rho_{+1}(1+i)U'(C^b_{+1}), \qquad (17)$$

$$q_{+1}c'(q_{+1}) = 2\rho_{+1}U'(C^s_{+1}).$$

 $\bullet~$  The steady state  $(i,\rho,q,C^b,C^s)$  solve

$$U'(\bar{\omega}^y - \rho) = \delta \frac{1+i}{1+\tau} \frac{U'(C^b) + U'(C^s)}{2},$$
(19)

$$qc'(q) = 2\rho U'(C^s), \qquad (20)$$

$$qu'(q) = 2\rho(1+i)U'(C^b),$$
 (21)

$$C^{b} = -(1+i)\rho + \bar{\omega}, \qquad (22)$$

$$C^s = (3+i)\rho + \bar{\omega}. \tag{23}$$

• Welfare (s(q) = u(q) - c(q) : surplus)

$$W = U(\bar{\omega}^y - \rho) + \delta \frac{s(q) + U(C^b) + U(C^s)}{2}.$$

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- Steady state welfare
  - Suppose that U(x) = x. FOCs in the DM

$$\frac{u'(q)}{c'(q)} = 1 + i = \frac{1 + \tau}{\delta}$$
(25)  
 $qc'(q) = 2\rho.$  (26)

• The central bank chooses  $i \ge 0$  to maximize welfare.

$$W = \bar{\omega}^y - \rho + \delta \{ 0.5s(q) + \bar{\omega} + \rho \}$$
(27)  
$$= \bar{\omega}^y + \delta \bar{\omega} + 0.5 \delta s(q) - (1 - \delta) \rho.$$
(28)

- Effect of nominal interest rate on welfare.
  - **1** Reduce the surplus s(q) ( $W \downarrow$ ).
  - **2** Reduce the intergenerational transfer  $\rho$  ( $W \uparrow$ ).

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## Optimal monetary policy

#### Theorem

The Friedman rule is not optimal.

#### Proof.

Welfare is a function of q:

$$W(q) = \frac{\delta}{2}s(q) - (1 - \delta)\rho(q) + \bar{\omega}^y + \delta\bar{\omega},$$
  

$$\rho(q) = \frac{1}{2}qc'(q).$$
(29)

The surplus s is maximized if i = 0. Since dq/di < 0, dW/di > 0.

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### Equilibrium without bank

• The FOC on money:

$$\phi = \delta \phi_{+1} \frac{1}{2} \left( \frac{u'(\hat{q})}{c'(\hat{q})} + 1 \right).$$
(30)

• Opportunity cost of holding money is higher in the model without banking.

$$2i = \frac{u'(\hat{q})}{c'(\hat{q})} - 1.$$
(31)

• Real balances are **doubled** in the model without banking:

$$\rho = \hat{q}c'(\hat{q}). \tag{32}$$

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# Optimal monetary policy

#### Theorem

Financial intermediation improves welfare (even) under the Friedman rule.

#### Proof.

Welfare:

$$W_{bank} = \frac{1}{2}\delta s(q) - (1-\delta)\frac{qc'(q)}{2} + const$$

$$W_{nobank} = \frac{1}{2}\delta s(\hat{q}) - (1-\delta)\hat{q}c'(\hat{q}) + const$$
(33)
(34)

Under the Friedman rule, quantity is efficient. Thus  $W_{bank} > W_{nobank}$  under the Friedman rule.

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### Log utility function

#### Theorem

Assume that  $u(q) = \ln q, c(q) = \frac{q^{1+\eta}}{1+\eta}$  and  $U(C) = \ln C$ . Then the allocation satisfies

$$\rho = \frac{\bar{\omega}}{3(1+i)}, \ q = \left(\frac{1}{3+2i}\right)^{1/(1+\eta)}$$
(35)

If  $\bar{\omega}^y/\bar{\omega}$  is less than 1/3, then the Friedman rule is not optimal.

#### Theorem

If the government can change the endowment by the intergenerational transfer policy such that  $\omega^y + \omega = \bar{\omega} + \bar{\omega}^y$ , the rule is still nonoptimal if  $\eta$  is sufficiently high.

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Conclusio	n				

- We construct the search theoretic OLG model with banking, and focus on the monetary policy maximizing the steady state welfare.
  - We find that the Friedman rule may not be optimal.
  - Non-optimality of the Friedman rule holds even if the intergenerational transfer policy is available.
- Results differ from Berentsen, Camera and Waller.
