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The Inflation behind the Political Instability of the Major Advanced Economies

Japanese economy after the Abenomics

- Japan's PM Shinzo Abe retired in the fall 2020 after struggling against the initial damage brought by the Covid-19 Pandemic.
- His successor, PM Yoshihide Suga, failed in handling the economic recovery under the still-continuing Pandemic in 2021.
- Japan's economy was normalized under the Kishida administration, helped by the availability of the mRNA vaccine which was the most frequently shot to Japanese people in the world.

Inflation and Russian Invasion to Ukraine

- The Corona-virus Pandemic seemed to be over in the early 2022, when Ukraine was attacked by Russia, which was followed by the global inflation and the associated rise in the interest rates.
- Under the Abenomics, the BOJ took the QQE (qualitative and quantitative easing) policy, which has kept the short-term interest rate closed to zero.
- The central banks in the west drastically raised the interest rates, while the BOJ did not, since the targeted rate of inflation was not achieved even though all the countries suffered the even higher inflation.

The Time-Horizon policy

- The BOJ kept the QQE policy even though the targeted rate of inflation (annual rate 2%) was achieved in the early 2023.
- The BOJ held a vision that the inflation target was sustainable only if it is associated with a sufficient rise in the nominal wage.
- In Japan, the nominal wage is negotiated between the management and the unions regularly in the late March.
- The BOJ extended the QQE until it confirmed that a sufficient wage increase was reported in the early spring 2024.

People complaints about the inflation

- Although the Abenomics was politically supported by the people, their life-standard was heavily damaged by the unexpected rise in the food and energy prices, which resulted in the loss of the LDP (Liberal Democratic Party) in the general election in October 2024.
- The unexpectedly-high rise in the food and energy prices were brought partly by the depreciation of the Japanese Yen from 110 yen per \$ in 2020 to 160 yen per \$ in July 2024.
- The BOJ finally decided to raise the short-term interest rate from 0.1% to 0.25% at the end of July 2024, which caused a financial turmoil in the early August.

CPI has not fully reflected the rise in the Import Price Index.

- The import price in Yen has risen by 80% since 2020, while the import price in \$ has not increased so much,
- The gap between the blue line and the orange line is the effect of the Yen depreciation on CPI.



The Rising Effects of the Weak Yen

• Since 2020, the CPI reflects only 14% of the rise in the import price index, while its 8% rise has come from the Yen depreciation.

The effect of Yen depreciation on CPI is rising





- In 2021, the effect of the import price rise on CPI came from the Yen depreciation only by less than 20%.
- In 2024 however, the effect of import price rise on CPI comes from the Yen depreciation by more than 50%.



The Yen Depreciation

Yen Depreciation



- Japanese Yen has been staying in the range of 100-120Y/\$ in the last three decades except for the period of 2008-2013.
- However, the current inflation reducing the international value of the Yen unexpectedly.

- Japan's inflation follows the world but is much behind US and Europe. It reached a peak in early 2023.
- Now the inflation rate seems to converge to 3 to 4 % in the three economies.

Cumulative Inflation Matters



- The impact of inflation on the national economy should be assessed by the cumulative inflation rate (or price level) from the base year to date, not the current inflation rate.
- Although inflation in Europe and the United States is subsiding, price levels are still about 30% higher than they were before 2015.
- Prices in Japan, too, have risen by about 10% compared to 2015.
- Even if the inflation rate declines in the short term, if wages do not rise enough to compensate for the decline in purchasing power, the standard of living will decline for most citizens.
- Some citizens who invest in stocks and foreign currency deposits can thereby preserve their own purchasing power, but those with few assets will suffer inflation.

Long-term interest rates




- For 2015-2019, US and Europe seems to leave the quantitative ease.
- However, the Coronavirus Pandemic suddenly prevented central banks from returning to normalization.
- In the recovery from the pandemic, the central banks let the long-term interest rates rise to 4% in US and 3% in Europe.
- In contrast to US and Europe, the BOJ has kept a very-low interest rate policy until recently, while the long-term interest rate is gradually rising to 1%.

Short-term interest rates








- The Covid-19 Period (2020-2021) :
 - US zero
 - Germany negative
 - Japan zero.
- In 2022, US and Germany started to raise the short-term interest rates, which has reached 5% in US and 4% in Germany.
- BOJ still keeps zero interest rate.

The Dollar (Yen) and the Long-term Interest Rate Gap between US and Japan




- After 2021, the U.S.-Japan interest rate differential appears to explain exchange rate fluctuations well.
- Before 2020, however, there does not appear to be a regular relationship between the U.S.-Japan interest rate differential and the exchange rate.
- In the 2010s, the U.S.-Japan interest rate differential fluctuated widely in response to changes in U.S. monetary policy, but the exchange rate remained very stable until 2021.

The Euro (Yen) and the Long-term Interest Rate Gap between EU and Japan



- Compared to the dollar-yen rate, the euro-yen rate appears to move relatively regularly to the Japan-Europe (Japan-Germany) interest rate differential.
- However, since 2013, the yen has tended to weaken excessively relative to the interest rate differential.


Short and Long Interest Rates: Japan



- For most time, the long-term interest has been higher than the short-term interest rate.
- In 2013 and 2017, the long-term interest rate was negative.
- Since 2017, the short-term interest rate has been negative.

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Inflation and the Interest Rate: US



The federal fund rate of US is still around 5%, while the US inflation rate is 3.3%. The consumption remains still high, partly because the high interest revenue may encourage US people to consume more.




On the contrary, the BOJ policy rate is only 0.25%, while the CPI inflation rate is still higher than 2%. The lawmakers and the BOJ seem to pay too much attention to the borrowers of loans, neglecting the positive income effect of increasing interest revenues.

Japan's household financial wealth is concentrated to bank deposits. A rise in the interest revenues might induce households to consume more.


Current Account



- Changes in the current account balance have not had a significant impact on the exchange rate.
- Germany's current account balance has been significantly in surplus since 2005.
- The U.S. current account balance deteriorated significantly until the Lehman crisis (2008), but then the deficit shrank until the Corona crisis.
- In contrast, the underlying tone of Japan's current account balance is a surplus, although not as large as Germany's, and tends to move just opposite to that of the U.S.
- Nevertheless, the impact of these factors on the exchange rate is unknown.




Monthly Review of the Economy



The inflation heavily damaged the life-standard for the common people in the US, UK, Germany, and Japan.

The real wage turned positive in 2023 in US, UK and Germany, while it still remains under zero in Japan.

BOJ Report on Prices of Exports and Imports



There is a wide discrepancy of the price indices denominated in the Yen and the U\$, which reflects the effect brought by the Yen depreciation.

The BOJ policy change in July 2024 seemed to be based on the recognition that the Yen depreciation was more likely to raise the domestic price level than before.





- Term of Trade is the ratio of export prices to import prices.
- Current inflation increases export prices and greatly benefits business and their shareholders.
- The term of trade of Japan improved drastically in 1980, had deteriorated since 1990 until 2008 (Lehman crisis), and since then has stabilized.
- However, it deteriorates again recently, reflecting world inflation.
- Japanese people's welfare is affected more by the import price index than by the export price index.
- The import price index is greatly affected by prices in food and energy.

Export Price Index: Yen and Dollar



Japan's export price index, with 2020 as 100, showing a long-term low trend through 2020.

The gap of the indices based on the yen and the contract currency suggests a large appreciation or depreciation of the U\$/yen.

Export and Import Price in Dollar

Export and Import Price Index (\$)



The dollar price of Japan's exports has shown a long-run stagnated trend, while the dollar price of Japan's imports increased in the early 2000s, reflecting the rise in the energy and food prices.

Import Price Index in Yen and Dollar

Import Price of Japan



In 1985, there was a sudden and large decline in Japan's import prices denominated in Yen, which was caused by the Plaza Accord that brought the rise and fall of the Japanese economy.

There is an increasing trend of Japan's import prices, mainly of food and energy.

Export and Import Price Index in Yen


Expor and Import Price Index (¥)



Japan's import prices in Yen are more volatile than Japan's export prices in Yen, suggesting the Yen appreciation is associated with the decline in food and energy prices.

Nominal versus Real Effective Exchange Rate

Nominal versus Real Effective Exchange Rate



Inflation is reflected in the REER, while it is not in the NEER, suggesting the larger decrease in the REER has been caused by Japan's low inflation rate relative to the west.

The Abenomics targeting acceleration of inflation has not effectively created inflation sufficient to raise the REER.



Consumer Price Index (CPI)

- Cumulative rise in CPI affects people's recognition of the economy more directly than the current rise in CPI.
- Cumulative CPI is normalized to 100 for 2020.
- In May 2024, Total CPI is 108.
- CPI is
 - 117 for food
 - 103 for housing rent
 - 113 for utility
 - 119 for home goods and furniture
- Most of food, energies, and home goods are imported from abroad, much affected by world inflation.

- World food prices rose sharply during the economic recovery after the Corona disaster. This is the main cause of the recent political turmoil.
- However, as we move into 2024, the price increase has subsided and some prices are declining.


- Although PM Abe resigned because of its failure of handling the anti-Corona measures, Corona was only one of the foreign circumstances that made his situation worse.
- These days, foreign circumstances have a greater impact on Japanese politics than the performance by domestic policies.
- The impact of foreign shocks on domestic politics differs depending on whether exchange rate fluctuations amplify the shocks or, conversely, reduce them.
- In the past, the dollar/yen rate moved in the direction of reducing shocks from abroad (war, recession, inflation, etc.), so politics was not destabilized.
- During the DPJ administration, world food prices were also high, but domestic prices did not rise because of the strong yen.
- Recently, however, the yen has weakened in tandem with rising international prices for energies and food, amplifying the shocks and increasing public dissatisfaction with politics.

How foreign exchange rates affect politics?

Living cost is more important than political scandals

- The dollar-yen rate has risen by about 1.5 times compared to its stable period. With rising food prices coming to Japan, it is no wonder that the approval rating of the administration is falling.
- The media is still saying that "politics-money scandals have caused distrust in politics," but the economy and people's lives are much more important.
- Gerald Curtis (Columbia University) said on Japanese TV that "the issue of politics and money is nothing compared to the era of Kakuei Tanaka and Shin Kanemaru."
- What the people are most upset about is the rising cost of living.
- Reflationists say, "There are many advantages to a weak yen," but they cannot persuade the public.

World Oil Price

- World oil prices remained stable at low levels until 2000, but rose sharply after 2000, reaching a high of around \$100 in the 2010s.
- The price then declined sharply through the Corona period but has recently risen sharply again.
- It can be said that the stability of the Abe administration has been brought by the low and stable price of crude oil.

Return of the Pessimism





- The long-term trend of the real index of the World Food Price (perhaps denominated by the CPI) shows that it was high until about 1975, then declined and remained stable at a low level until about 2005.
- The period from 1975 to 2005 can be described as a period of optimism, while the period after 2005 is the return of pessimism originally proposed by the Club of Rome in 1972, which emphasized the upcoming food crisis.
- The rise in the price of food and energy might have been brought by the Globalization with economic growth of emerging countries.¹

Changes in Power Supply Composition

Energy consumption in power supply has significantly declined in the last decade, while Japan's real GDP is growing.

Energy saving has been driven by the efforts of the government and the industries to avoid the energy shortage after the east-Japan mega-earthquake and the nuclear power plant accident in 2011.

What drives foreign exchange rates?

Theories to explain exchange rates

- Current account approach: The idea that exchange rates are determined by current transactions of currencies, such as trade balance and income balance. This was the mainstream approach until the 1970s.
- Asset approach: The idea that exchange rates are determined by asset transactions such as deposits, bonds, and stocks, which became the mainstream idea around the 1980s.
- Interest rate parity
- Purchasing power parity
- Labor Productivity

Uncovered Interest rate parity (UIRP)

- The idea that exchange rates are determined in such a way as to equalize the rates of return of each currency.
- There are different versions with and without currency hedging.
- For example, the currency of a high-interest-rate country will eventually depreciate, but at the start of the comparison, the currency will instead rise in value to reflect future depreciation.

- To complicate matters, for example, the dollar/Yen rate is currently appreciating due to the large difference in interest rates between Japan and the U.S.
- However, in order for the rate of return to equalize, the dollar should depreciate in the future. However, in a phase of widening interest rate differentials, the currencies of higher-interest-rate countries will apparently rise.
- Under the interest rate parity theory with currency hedging on the contrary, the rate of return on a currency is equalized after paying a premium to protect against exchange rate fluctuations.

Covered Interest Rate Parity (CIRP)

- You can hedge the return to invest in dollar by signing a forward contract to sell dollars at forward rate,
- Assume that the interest rate per annum is 0% for Japan, 5% for US.
- The spot rate is \$1=\$150.
- If you invest ¥1500 into Yen, you will get \$1500 one year later.
- Today you will get \$10 by exchange your ¥1500 for dollars.
- If you invest \$10 into dollar, you will get \$10.5 one year later.
- If the yen appreciates one year later, your investment return will lose a part of its value if you convert it to Yen.

- But you can assure the Yen value of your investment into by selling dollars at a forward rate.
- If you now sign a forward contract to sell your dollar at forward rate 142.857(=1500/10.5), you will get ¥1500 for sure one year later.
- This is the covered interest rate parity.
- The forward rate is based not on the investor's speculation on the future exchange rate but on the prevailing interest rate spread.
- CIRP always holds if various transaction costs, institutional differences, and political costs are considered.

Purchasing Power Parity (PPP)

- PPP says that exchange rate will converge to the rate at which all the prices of commodities will be equated across countries.
- However, the market exchange rate might diverge from its PPP rate for long time.

- Japanese yen has been overvalued against US dollar for 5 decades until 2021.
- Japanese yen has been undervalued against Euro for 5 decades. Diversion seems to expand.
- Euro was against US dollar
 - undervalued for 1999-2003
 - overvalued for 2003-2015
 - undervalued for 2015-

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


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

Labor Productivity?





- Productivity seems not to well explain the exchange rate.
- GDP per hour worked in Japan has been 70% of the US.
- There is no such a large decline in Japan's labor productivity from its peak recorded in the middle of 1990s.
- No Japanese people have complained about the weak Yen until 2021, even though the relative labor productivity has been much lower than US for a long time.
- Relative decline in productivity in Europe seems to be larger than in Japan, while no continuing trend of Euro depreciation is observed,
- Japan's labor productivity might be undervalued because of some data problem.

Summary

- Interest Rate Parity (UIRP or CIRP) seems to most convincingly explain the current Yen depreciation, while there are many residuals to be explained by other theories.
- The flow factors such as trade and capital investment, seem to be too small to generate such a large trend toward the weak Yen.
- Speculative incentives might affect the Yen depreciation.
- In the long-run, foreign exchange rates tend to converge to their PPP, while their inexplicable deviation might emerge for very long time.
- Productivity gap does not well explain the long-term trend of foreign exchange rates.







Factorization of Real Wage 1995-2022




In the last 3 decades, Japan's real wage did not grow at all!

Japan's life standard might have deteriorated relatively to that of the western country, while Japan's daily life does not such a large stagnation.



(参考)実質賃金上昇率の要因分解について




Productivity and Real Wage: Advanced Economies



Japan is different from other G7 countries in the sense that there is a larger gap between labor productivity and the real wage.

This gap is explained mainly by the deterioration of the terms of trade = GDP deflator minus CPI.

Productivity and Real Wage: Northern Europe



Interestingly, like Japan, Norway has a large discrepancy between real wages and labor productivity. However, this probably means that labor productivity growth is too large (and oil prices too high) to be used for social security instead of wage increases.


Norway's average annual real wage increase over the past 30 years has been 2%. Japan's is negative.

If Japan had abundant resources, there would be no need for intergenerational conflict over pensions and health care, and they could pay pensions with the proceeds from the sale of resources.

Manufacturing: Japan and US




Labor productivity in manufacturing has been steadily growing both in Japan and US, while employment has declined in both Japan and US.

The popular theory that employment moves to the industry in which productivity grows faster, does not work in the real world.

Information Technology

IT: Japan and US




In the Information technology industry, the relation between productivity growth and employment differs drastically between Japan and US.

In Japan, productivity has stagnated in the last two decades, while employment has steadily grown.

In US, productivity seems to have grown in the last two decades, while employment temporarily stagnated around 2010.

Construction

Construction: Japan and US



Surprisingly, the one Japanese industry that performs better than the U.S. is construction. In the U.S., as usual, employment fluctuates widely with economic changes, but from 2001 to 2020, labor productivity has declined.

In contrast, in Japan, labor productivity grew substantially. Perhaps the slump observed in the 2000s reflects the financial sector crisis, which continued until the early 2010s.

Abenomics led to a recovery in the real estate market as well as in the labor productivity of the industry.

Discussion

- 1. The stagnation and decline in productivity in Japan's information and telecommunications industry as employment increases can be attributed to the large price declines experienced as information services become more widespread.
- 2. How should we explain the steady increase in productivity in the U.S. without the similar productivity stagnation?
- 3. The relatively better performance of Japan's construction industry might have been brought by the demand recovery created by the monetary easing under the Abenomics.



The left table was the BOJ's price forecast as of April 28, 2023, which showed a much higher price forecast for FY23 but a decline to less than 2% in FY24. Therefore, last spring, the end of the extra-dimensional easing was postponed.

BOJ Inflation Forecast

The right table is the BOJ's price outlook as of the end of January 2024. First of all, we can see that the Bank of Japan had estimated prices for FY2023 to be about 1% lower than they were at the end of April 2023. This is the reason for the delay in the policy shift, but the previous governor, Kuroda, left office last spring. It was difficult for newly appointed Governor Ueda to make a dramatic change in policy immediately after his predecessor retreated.




(図表6-2) 国債等の保有者内訳





- According to the Bank of Japan's Flow of Funds statistics, the BOJ's share of JGBs was around 10% until 2012. That has now reached 47%.
- Mr. Shirakawa, the former Governor of the Bank of Japan, must have realized that holding such a huge amount of JGBs would leave the BOJ with little flexibility in its monetary policy.
- The outstanding amount of JGBs itself has been on a leveling off trend since 2020. This is probably the result of both the consumption tax hike and the inflation tax.

Balance Sheets of the Central Banks



Whereas European and U.S. central banks were quick to shrink their central bank balance sheets in response to the recent rise in inflation, the BOJ lagged behind in asset reduction.

- The BOJ's BS problem is that if the BOJ
 reduces its holdings of JGBs as it cuts back
 on monetary easing, interest rates will rise
 both on government debts and on reserve
 deposits held by private banks with the BOJ,
 causing the BOJ to run a deficit.
- The BOJ refers to three scenarios. Under the first scenario, the deficit will continue for 20 years because the balance of JGBs held by the BOJ will be dramatically reduced.
- In contrast, in the second and third scenarios, the BOJ will continue to purchase JGBs, so the balance of JGBs held by the BOJ will not decrease that much and the deficit will be avoided because the BOJ will receive both the advantages and disadvantages of higher interest rates.
- The question is whether there is a way for the BOJ to raise interest rates without selling JGBs.

QT: FRB, ECB and BOJ

- Since the Lehman crisis, central banks in Japan, the U.S., and Europe have dramatically increased their holdings of government bonds.
- This trend was further extended in response to the Corona disaster.
- However, in order to cope with inflation during the economic recovery period, the central banks in Europe and the U.S. rapidly reduced their JGB holdings, whereas the BOJ's reduction of its JGB holdings did not proceed rapidly.
- The reason is that the BOJ holds far more bonds as a percentage of GDP than the Western central banks. At its peak, the BOJ's bond holdings exceed 120% of GDP, while the Western central banks' bond holdings are 30-60% of GDP.
- This means that a rise in interest rates will have a greater impact on the BOJ's BS than on the US and European Central Banks.




Share of ECB holding to the EU sovereign debts


(図表5) ユーロシステムの国債買い入れ割合





- The central banks of European countries have incurred many deficits in the process of BS contraction, but the accumulated deficits are expected to be eliminated around 2030.
- Thus, there is not much concern that rising interest rates will destabilize central bank finances, and currency depreciation has not occurred. Rather, the European currency is overvalued.
- There are a number of ways for the BOJ to allow interest rates to rise and not fall into deficit, so why hasn't the BOJ raised interest rates?
- Perhaps it is because raising interest rates is expected to bring about a recession in the short term. Not only would a rate hike make it more difficult for small and medium-sized businesses to finance their operations, but there are also concerns that it would raise mortgage rates and create a bad loan problem in the real estate sector.
- Of fundamental importance, however, is that higher interest rates will make government budgeting more difficult.

債務残高の国際比較(対GDP比)



- It is clear that the ratio of government debt to GDP rises during deflationary periods and falls during inflationary periods.
- During the DPJ administration, life was easier due to a strong yen and deflation, but the government's finances worsened as a result.
- With Abenomics, the yen depreciated, and disinflation reduced the debt to GDP ratio.
- Japan's debt ratio reduction is smaller than in the U.S. and Europe, where inflation is higher.

Government Debts Matters

- Despite the rapid growth of outstanding government debt, interest payments have continued to decline thanks to very low interest rates.
- However, if the BOJ reduces monetary easing, interest rates will rise, and higher interest expenses will make it difficult for the government to compile a budget.
- It is said that raising interest rates would result in a loss of earnings for the BOJ.
 But the fundamental reason for the inability to raise interest rates is the government budget deficit.
